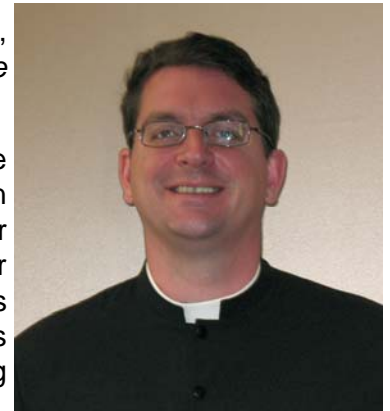

## RECTOR'S MESSAGE

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

As we sojourn through the long 'Green' season (otherwise known as Pentecost), let me stop and ask, "*What have **you** done to bring God to others? What have **you** done specifically to shine the light of Christ unto your corner of the world?*"

As you may recall in your Baptismal vows, Confirmation vows and through the Gospels, we are called as Disciples of Christ. This means we can't have an individualistic mentality of our religion. We must know those around us for support and also act to bring new people to Christ. What we need is action! Our walk with Christ is not a dormant one, filled with comfort or idle pass-times, nor is it ever complete until He says and calls us home. Our passage through this lifetime should be marked by our servant leadership, silent prayer and answering God's call for us.



One way that we may grow together as a parish family as well as to provide an opportunity for evangelization directly to our community is on those months that we have a 5<sup>th</sup> Sunday. My hope is that we take advantage of those Sundays in order that we get to know each other better, as well as we will have the opportunity to show off our faith in Him to whom all that we are and all that we have has been given. We will begin joining together as a parish family in worship in those months that have a '5<sup>th</sup> Sunday' (August '10, October '10, January '11, July, '11)\*.

Following our liturgy, we will come together and share a **potluck breakfast meal** together. What better way to grow more intimate with those already known to you and to shine God's love on those we still haven't had the opportunity to meet.

My prayer is that each of you will get acquainted and also bring a friend to share in the joy of God's bountiful gifts offered to us and by us at Saint Barnabas. These Sunday's should provide a focused opportunity for all of us to live out our duty to '*go make disciples of men*'.

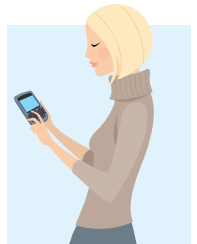

## SAINT LAWRENCE

Lawrence (whose name is also spelled Laurence) was born, perhaps of Spanish parents, in the early part of the third century. While still a young man he came to Rome where Bishop Sixtus (Xystus) II ordained him a deacon, and he was made the chief of the seven deacons of Rome, responsible for the distribution of the charities of the church and the care of its properties.



In 257 the Roman emperor Valerian began a vigorous persecution of the church, aimed primarily at the clergy and the laity of the upper classes. All of the properties of the church were confiscated and assemblies for worship forbidden. On August 4, 258 the Bishop of Rome, Sixtus II who had just become bishop the year before, and his deacons were apprehended at the cemetery of Callistus where they were celebrating the liturgy, and all except Lawrence were summarily executed and buried in the same cemetery... Lawrence, who knew of the location of the church's treasure, was tortured and then executed on August 10.

The traditions that have come down to us concerning the martyrdom are unreliable, but they are nonetheless amusing... It is said that the behavior of Lawrence in jail was such as to have led to the conversion and baptism of his jailer Hippolytus and his family. When the governor is said to have demanded the treasures, Lawrence is said to have gathered together a great number of the blind, the lame, the maimed, lepers, orphans, and widows of Rome and brought them to the governor's palace, saying, "Here is the treasure of the church." He was, tradition says, condemned to die slowly and painfully by roasting on an iron grill. Even there Lawrence's courage and humor were apparent, for he is reported to have said at one point to his executioners, "I am done on this side. Turn me over." [It is more probable that] Lawrence was beheaded, as was Sixtus.

St. Lawrence met death on August 10, 258, and his feast is listed in the martyrologies as early as the fourth century. During the reign of the Emperor Constantine a church was built over his tomb in the catacomb on the Via Tiburtina. It was enlarged by Pelagius II (579 – 590) into the basilica now known as St. Lawrence outside the Walls (San Lorenzo fuori de Mura) and became one of the seven principal churches of Rome and a favorite place for Roman pilgrimages.

The torture and execution of a Roman citizen by Roman authorities made a deep impression on the young church, stunned by such hostility, and his martyrdom was one of the first to be commemorated by the church. He is commemorated universally but especially in the West where hundreds of churches and many cities have him as their patron.

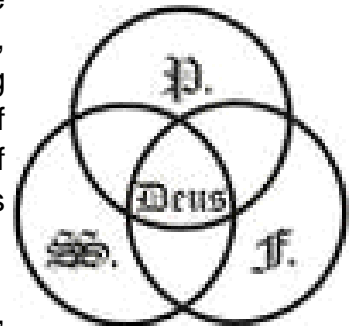

## SACRED SHAPE: THE CIRCLE

The circle is a symbol of eternity because it has no beginning and no end. The circle was of strong symbolic importance to early humans because of its association with the sun, moon and stars. In some early Christian manuscripts depicting Christ sitting on the throne in heaven, the earth at his feet is rendered as a circle. (See Isaiah 40:22: "It is he who sits above the circle of the earth...") During the Renaissance, the circle and the sphere were considered the perfect shapes, conforming to Renaissance thinkers' idea of God. He was the cosmic god who took the form of a sphere containing the whole universe – spirit, mind, and matter, depicted in descending concentric circles. Renaissance architects, following the principles of Leon Battista Alberti, reverted to the circle as the basis of design for churches. A strong example is Donato Bramante's Tempietto of San Pietro, built in Rome. In historic Christian symbolism, three circles intertwined refer to the Trinity.



As an architectural device, the sphere or semi-sphere, like the circle or arch, represents the sky or the heavens. (The dome is also an architectural metaphor for the heavens because its interior shape is concave.)

Rings, like circles, are symbols of eternity and permanent union. The wedding ring is the symbol of an unbreakable union. A bishop's ring signifies his union with the church, a nun's ring her spiritual marriage to Christ.

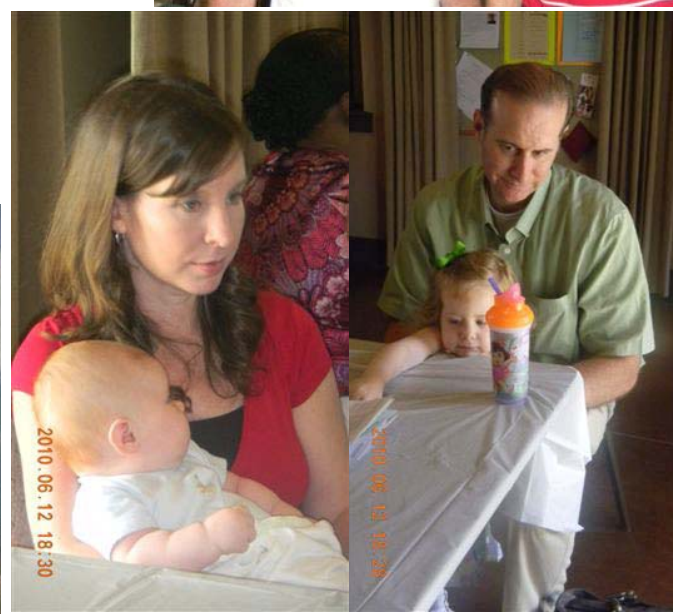

## THE STORY BEHIND THE HYMN:

### ***ALL THINGS BRIGHT AND BEAUTIFUL***

One day, Mrs. Cecil Frances Alexander was working with one of her pupils in Sunday school – a little boy who happened to be her godson. He was struggling to understand the Apostles' Creed and certain portions of the catechism. Mrs. Alexander began to mull the possibility of converting the Apostles' Creed into songs for children, using simple little hymns to explain the phrases and truths of the Christian faith to little ones.



The Apostles' Creed begins: *I believe in God, the Father Almighty, Maker of heaven and earth, and in Jesus Christ, His only Son, our Lord.* For the phrase, “Maker of heaven and earth...” she wrote the lovely little song, “All Things Bright and Beautiful.” She based the hymn on Genesis 1:31: “*Then God saw everything that He had made, and indeed it was very good.*”

The Apostles' Creed goes on to say about Jesus Christ: “...*who was conceived of the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary...*” That spurred the writing of “Once in David's Royal City.”

The next phrase, “...*suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried,*” became the basis for Mrs. Alexander's hymn, “There is a Green Hill Far Away.” According to one account, the imagery Mrs. Alexander used for that hymn came about as she was driving into the city of Derry, Ireland, to do some shopping. Alongside the road, near the old city walls was a little grass-covered hill. Somehow, this knoll helped her visualize Calvary, and from that came the inspiration for the hymn.

The Creed goes on to speak of the Second Coming of Christ, prompting Mrs. Alexander to write a lesser-known but still beautiful hymn entitled, “He is Coming! He is Coming!” which contrasts the Lord's first coming as a babe with His return in power and glory.

These hymns were published in 1848 in Mrs. Alexander's book, *Hymns for Little Children*. It became one of the most successful hymn-publishing projects in history, going through over one hundred editions. Mrs. Alexander published many other books and hymnals... but nothing has stood the test of time like the powerful combination of the Apostles' Creed and her own gift for song.

*All things bright and beautiful, All creatures great and small,*

*All things wise and wonderful, The Lord God made them all.*

### This Month in Church History

**August 1, 1779** - Francis Scott Key, author of "The Star Spangled Banner" and one of the founders of the Sunday School Union, was born.

**August 11, 1890** - John Henry Newman died. Newman was ordained an Anglican priest in 1824. He later helped lead the Oxford Movement, aiming to restore the Church of England to its high church principles. In 1843 he left the church and became a Roman Catholic,

**August 13, 1587** - Members of Sir Walter Raleigh's expedition to Roanoke baptized a Native American named Manteo. This was the first recorded Anglican baptism in the American colonies.

**August 20, 1965** - Civil rights worker Jonathan Myrick Daniels, an Episcopalian seminarian from New Hampshire, was shot and killed in Alabama.

**August 23, 1948** - The World Council of Churches was formally constituted in Amsterdam.

**August 26, 1498** - Pope Alexander VI commissioned Michelangelo to carve the Pieta.

**August 29, 30** - According to tradition, John the Baptist was beheaded.

**August 31, 1159** - Adrian (or Hadrian) IV, the only English pope in history, died in Anagni, Italy.

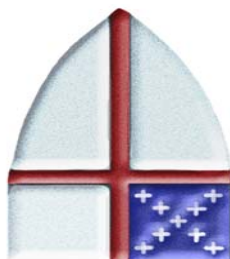
