RECTOR'S MESSAGE

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

"Now faith is being sure of what we hope for and certain of what we do not see." Hebrews 11:1

We must be Sure and Certain of the Unseen, but are we? Do we have faith enough in our God? It is amazing that with only a few clicks on a computer, we can dramatically alter photos. Such capabilities have led us to be a bit more wary. We find ourselves saying, "Unless I see it with my own eyes, how can I believe that it hasn't been touched up? I'll believe it when I see it." Often this cynical attitude can touch our spiritual life. How can I believe that God loves me and knows what is going on in my life considering all troubles and disappointments I have to deal with? It doesn't take much for us to see where



one of Jesus' own disciples was coming from when he replied, "Unless I see the nail marks in his hands and put my finger where the nails were, and put my hand into his side, I will not believe it" (John 20:25). I'll believe it when I see it.

That is in stark contrast to what we read in the Bible, "Now faith is being sure of what we hope for and certain of what we do not see." How can we be sure and certain of things we can't see, can't prove? Think of a father and child playing the game where the father stands behind the child and tells him to fall backwards. The child, unable to see his father, still trusts that he is there and is certain that his father won't let him hit the ground. The child leans back and falls, fully convinced that his father will keep his word and catch him, because his father has always proved trustworthy.

"Faith is being sure of what we hope for and certain of what we do not see." Though we did not see the creation or the crucifixion, though we were not present to witness the Savior rising from the Easter tomb, though we have not heard his actual voice forgiving our sins and promising his return, we believe. How can we be so sure and certain? God's word is true and trustworthy. Our forgiveness is certain because Jesus did die and rise from the dead. God's love for us today and every day is sure. Every promise our Father has made about our eternal future, he will keep. Faith is sure and certain of unseen things simply because it takes God at his word. Have faith and no matter what life throws our way, be Sure and Certain we will make it through by the Grace of God.

* The nursery is available for those in need.


MEDICAL EQUIPMENT LOAN CLOSET



Last summer after receiving donations of medical equipment, The Outreach Committee decided to start a Medical Equipment Loan Closet. We became the recipients of a few pieces of equipment from the late Col. Henry Sherborne's household. On occasion we would receive a request for a wheelchair or a walker. Seeing the need we decided that we could help others by loaning out this equipment.

We then had committee members with crutches they wanted to donate, or knew someone that had a shower chair they wanted to give to someone in need. Committee member Barbara Sanders mentioned that her husband

Dick may be able to help out as he had done at their former parish. Dick Sanders inspects, repairs, and replaces whatever is needed so that every piece in our inventory is in working condition and ready for loan. Barbara Sanders then cleans and places a St. Barnabas name and address sticker on each piece.





If you have equipment to donate or are in need, please let one of the Committee members know. The following is a list of our current inventory: 1 motorized wheelchair, 1 folding wheelchair, 2 walker canes, 1 adjustable metal cane, 3 folding walkers without wheels, 4 folding walkers with wheels, 1 folding 4 wheeled walker with seat and basket, 2 wooden canes, 3 pairs metal crutches, 1 pair wooden crutches, 2 bedside commodes, 1 raised toilet seat, 2 shower benches, 1 wheeled oxygen canister holder, and 2 folder grabbers.

Using the funds made available from an Outreach Endowment made to St. Barnabas, the Outreach Committee members interviewed several non-profit programs in the Tullahoma area and narrowed their choices to the needs of **Shepherd's House**, for a bedroom renovation.

Upon review, the Outreach Committee members decided to use the "hands on" approach, to make the funds available to St. Barnabas' Outreach Program stretch further and to make renovations to the bedroom more like the quality we each would wish to have in our own home.

Tina Holman, Shepherd's House Director, met with St. Barnabas' Outreach Committee members and a color theme was selected. Photos of the room and measurements were taken and committee members donated their time and efforts to bring together a delightful arrangement.

Shopping was coordinated and painting was done. After the new paint dried, Shepherd's House residents helped move the heavy furniture back in, the weekend before the "big reveal." Then, the furniture and floors were cleaned and polished, window coverings, shelves and a mirror were installed. Pictures were hung and three beds were refurbished with the new linens, pillows and under-bed storage containers that were brought in.

After months of planning, the Outreach Committee members were able to complete the renovations of a bedroom for the **Shepherd's House**, a home for temporary homeless/jobless people in the Tullahoma area.

Fr. Murphy dedicated the room during an Open House on Sunday afternoon, July 31st. Refreshments were provided by St. Barnabas' Outreach Committee Members attending.

CONSTANCE AND HER COMPANIONS, MARTYRS OF MEMPHIS SEPTEMBER 9TH

In August, 1878, Yellow Fever invaded the city of Memphis for the third time in ten years. By the month's end the disease had become epidemic and a quarantine was ordered. While 30,000 citizens had fled in terror, 20,000 more remained to face the pestilence. As cases multiplied, death tolls averaged 200 daily. When the worst was over ninety percent of the population had contracted the Fever; more than 5,000 people had died.

In that time of panic and flight, many brave men and women, both lay and cleric, remained at their posts of duty or came as volunteers to assist despite the terrible risk. Notable among these heroes were Con-



stance, Superior of the work of the Sisters of St. Mary in Memphis, and her Companions. The Sisters had come to Memphis in 1873, at Bishop Quintard's request, to found a Girls School adjacent to St. Mary's Cathedral. When the 1878 epidemic began, George C. Harris, the Cathedral Dean, and Sister Constance immediately organized relief work among the stricken. Helping were six of Constance's fellow Sisters of St. Mary; Sister Clare from St. Margaret's House, Boston; the Reverend Charles C. Parsons, Rector of Grace and St. Lazarus Church, Memphis; and the Reverend Louis S. Schuyler, assistant at Holy Innocents, Hoboken. The Cathedral group also included three physicians, two of whom were ordained Episcopal priests, the Sisters' two matrons, and several volunteer nurses from New York. They have ever since been known as "The Martyrs of Memphis," as have those of other Communions who ministered in Christ's name during this time of desolation.

The Cathedral buildings were located in the most infected region of Memphis. Here, amid sweltering heat and scenes of indescribable horror, these men and women of God gave relief to the sick, comfort to the dying, and homes to the many orphaned children. Only two of the workers escaped the Fever. Among those who died were Constance, Thecla, Ruth and Frances, the Reverend Charles Parsons and the Reverend Louis Schuyler. The six martyred Sisters and priests are buried at Elmwood Cemetery. The monument marking the joint grave of Fathers Parsons and Schuyler bears the inscription: "Greater Love Hath No Man." The beautiful High Altar in St. Mary's Cathedral, Memphis, is a memorial to the four Sisters.

September 2 - On this day in 1752, Great Britain replaced the inaccurate calendar created by Julius Caesar in 46 BC with the Gregorian calendar.

September 7 - On this day in 1783, Evangelical Anglican Robert Raikes formed the Sunday School Society to raise money for weekly Christian schools, which met each Sunday from 10:00 am until 5:00 pm—the original Sunday schools.

September 8 - On this day in 1795, William White was consecrated the fourth Presiding Bishop of The Episcopal Church.

September 9 - On this day in 1087, William I, "The Conqueror" of England in 1066 and founder of several monasteries, died.

September 14 - On this day in 1847, Holy Eucharist was celebrated by an Anglican priest for the first time in Mexico.

September 22 - On this day in 1991, The Dead Sea Scrolls were made available to the public for the first time, by the Huntington Library.

September 26 - On this day in 1863, Frederick William Faber, priest and and hymnist, died. Faber is known for the hymns "Faith of Our Fathers" and "There's a Wideness in God's Mercy."
